Life writing, the recording of selves, memories and experiences can hardly be thought without its connection to space. Who we are, how we narrate ourselves depends on our ability, our desire or failure to locate our identity in the places that surround us. As such, spaces and selves are interdependent. Selves are partly constituted through the spaces they live in and our understanding of subjectivity tends to draw on spatial metaphors. At the same time individuals

produce specific spaces through their spatial practices, through the use they make of them and

the meaning they attribute to them.

Topics for discussion are: the geographies and topographies of life stories; the significance of journeys and movement between places for self-formation; the grounding or uprooting of the self in terms of place (homelands, displacements etc); the role of memory and the interplay of present and absent places; imagined spaces as substitutes for absent and lost places.
